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





#### HERMAN MENKIS March 15, 1923 - July 27, 1998 MEMORIAL ISSUE

Herman's first published problem in IMR was #380 in IMR-8 of March 1984. Since that time he has been a prolific contributor to IMR - with many, many hundreds of original problems.

He was born and raised in Brooklyn, New York (as was your editor!) Until much later in life, he was not involved with chess problems. He played chess games for many years, especially in Lincoln Terrace Park in Brooklyn - and was there very active in teaching chess to youngsters.

During his life, he was employed as a draftsman, and then purchasing agent, and finally spent many years as an independent insurance broker and agent in Long Island, New York.

It was only at just about retirement age, that he first became interested in the chess problem. (It was shortly thereafter that he and his wife Arline moved to Albuquerque, New Mexico.) He very soon became aware of the idealmate program and became so enthusiastic about it that the large bulk of his work was devoted almost exclusively to the ideal-mate. Looking back at all his work, one would be struck by how ideally the idealmate concept fit so wonderfully with his composing personality.

He maintained always very high standards for his creations. I also greatly admired his wonderful characteristic of never caring about prizes and awards - to him the artistic challenge of "art for art's sake" was always paramount.

In this last year, a number of serious medical problems, including Parkinson's, diabetes, and severe eye problems, made it extremely difficult for him and yet he continued to compose till literally the very end despite these obstacles. We are fortunate to thus have 15 new originals from him (see the next page!).

His devoted wife Arline played a crucial role in these last difficult weeks. Though she did not know chess she was able to serve as "his eyes and ears" in relaying to me time and again his latest compositions, achieved under such trying circumstances.

He is survived also by two sons: Daniel and Benjamin.


By his remarkable talents and labors over these past 14 years, he has truly achieved an exalted niche in the history of our beloved art form - which shall be crystallized soon by the many hundreds of his works to be chosen for the Ideal-Mate Encylopedia. It has been a wonderful experience working with him over these years, for which I am fervently grateful.



As of now (March 2012), the last published issue of IMR was #105 (2009). But I had received very many originals since then, and want to apologize to their composers for this long delay in publishing them.

Now I have finally "organized" the situation, and have 3 new issues with all the waiting originals: #106, #107, and #108 all being done at this time, and which will all be mailed at the same time. It seemed convenient to give them the dates 2010, 2011, 2012 in that order.

I am now 82 years old (as of January 9) and in reasonably good health. I would like to use my remaining time to choose and print (either in IMR or by electronic base) the best of the about 40,000 idealmates now in my overall collection. (I especially appreciate the large number of international magazines which have been sent to me in exchange with IMR, from which I have found many further idealmates.)

Up till now, there has been space in IMR only for originals! But now a change in IMR seems to be needed, of a rather extreme form! Henceforth, I will not be accepting further originals for publication in IMR!

I might mention here that of my previous two volumes of books titled IDEAL-MATE ENCYCLOPEDIA, copies of volume 1 are no longer available. But I do have some of volume 2, and would be pleased to send it to anyone who wishes it (with no charge). Also many of the later issues of IMR are available (again at no charge) so let me know which issues you are missing. Please print clearly your name and address, with your request.

In closing, I want to express appreciation to all those chess composers who have turned out so many interesting ideal-mates.
